#### St Mary's is our link with the past ...

Parts of St Mary's date back to the 13<sup>th</sup> century however the church has been greatly altered since then. The south wall of the nave and the tower are original. However the south-west and north-west corners of the tower have been reinforced by the addition of a corner buttress built of the same local mud-stone but not bonded into the main structure.

It was in the 19th Century that the church evolved into the building we see today. First, in 1816 the nave was completely re-roofed, and a porch was added on the south wall. In 1853 the tower was embattled and the aisle, arcade and semi-transept were built. In 1869 the chancel was completely rebuilt under the guidance of the renowned architect, Ewan Christian.

The interior of the church is well lit with natural light flooding in through the windows, which are mainly of leaded Cathedral glass with just three filled with stained glass. The window on the south wall is by the celebrated glass artist, Christopher Whall.

# St Mary's has always been an integral part of the village ...

Services for the faithful have been held on the majority of Sundays ever since St Mary's was built.

The church has supported and comforted families through adversity – through the plague of 1604, the world wars of the  $20^{\text{th}}$  century and through all the social change since the  $13^{\text{th}}$  century.

The village school started in the tower room of St Mary's, moving to a school newly built in 1855, now the Village Hall, and then to the Church of England Primary School that our children attend today. We have been left a great legacy, of both heritage and faith, and it is our sincerest hope that this appeal will be a springboard to new adventures in the years ahead.

#### Why is St Mary's important?

St Mary's is the beautiful and historic focal point of the village conservation area.

In addition to its regular services, Christmas, Easter, Harvest and Remembrance Sunday provide a continuity of worship that has enriched the lives of generations of villagers and continues to do so.

It represents the cultural and philosophical legacy that has underpinned our own lives and should be there for our children and our children's children.

Furthermore, it is there for family baptisms, weddings and funerals. It provides support for the lonely and those in need – and particularly for the elderly.

Through the village C of E Primary School, it ensures that our children are imbued with the Christian values that will enable them to contribute to and build a caring society.

In conjunction with other village organisations, the church makes a significant contribution to key village events.

## Why does St Mary's need your support?

As with all historic buildings, we are only custodians of this legacy for future generations.

However, being a listed building, there is a significant cost in its operation.

St Mary's typically costs  $\pounds 20,000$  to  $\pounds 25,000$  a year to operate.

During 2014 and 2015, £15,000 has been spent on repairs to the church roof, lychgate and church yard.

Maintenance of this listed building has to be undertaken to exacting (and hence expensive) standards.

No direct government funds are received, and we continue to be heavily dependent on the regular income derived from parishioners. Support has always been generous, but we need to replace the contributions that are lost over time.

We anticipate that an additional  $\pounds 10,000$  a year will be required to secure the future of the church.

This is a big challenge but, inclusive of Gift Aid, this could be achieved on the basis of

140 people giving £5 per month or 70 people giving £10 per month or 35 people giving £20 per month or 13 people giving £50 per month
