On preparing for our annual general meeting in March, we realised that there were two very important anniversaries this year - one is that the Great War commenced on  $28^{th}$  July 1914, so it is the  $110^{th}$  anniversary, and the other anniversary is that Bleasby's devastating plague was in the year 1604, arising firstly in Gibsmere with the first death on  $2^{nd}$  April of that year - so this year of 2024 is its  $420^{th}$  anniversary. These are surely two anniversaries that we should both remember and acknowledge.
